# MEDICAL INFORMATION

#### DIABETES

In the U.S. 18,000,000 individuals are known to have diabetes. Each year over 200,000 die from diabetes complications. Blindness, limb amputations and kidney failure are the most common side effects.

Since 1991 adults with diabetes have increased by over 60%. Type II, the most common, is found predominantly in those of advanced age who are obese and lack exercise, although some teenagers are affected. Some risk factors include: over 45 years of age, obese, lack of exercise, family history of diabetes, high blood pressure, abnormal cholesterol, and vascular disease. Diabetes is racial: African-Americans, Mexicans, Asian-Americans and American Indians, as a group, are over twice as likely to develop diabetes as Caucasians. In fact, one tribe of American-Indians has a 50% rate of diabetes.

It is estimated that well over 5,000,000 more individuals in the U.S. have diabetes, but are unaware of it.

From 3 to 4PM, August 5th, diabetic testing will be available at the Senior Center to ANY individual from our community. For those who desire to be tested, no food should be consumed one to two hours prior to testing.

### OUT OF AFRICA Pat Minshall

As many of you know I spent the last 6 wks. in Africa building houses in Zambia with "Habitat for Humanity", then on to Kenya to build for "Americans for Children with Aids/Hiv"

Habitat is a wonderful organization that spans the world trying to bring safe affordable houses to low income families. These houses are not free, small loans usually interest free or very low interests are charged. You must qualify to get into the program and you also have to do "sweat equity", work on building your home. It's a hand up not a hand out.

In Zambia we were in a small village outside the capital of Lusaka. There was no electricity or running water. We slept on the floor of small huts, brought "solar water shower bags" and used a three cubicle shower stall that they had built for us out of branches and hay, a similar hut had a pit latrine.

We built 2 houses of "mud fired brick" that were village made, these were held together with cement which we with some local help mixed. Our team of 11 was divided between the two houses. The houses were fairly large about 7-800ft. with 3-4 rooms. We finished one home but a death in the family stopped work on the other house that was 1/2 finished. The man of the family I was building with said, "I love it, white people building my were many hugs, thanks and songs for our departure.

The next time you get into a shower, tum on the tap, your house", it was said with fun and joy and we all really got a kick out of it.

The women (who do so much of the work here) cooked our meals, washed our clothes, filled our solar showers and carried all the water in 10-15 gal. plastic cans on their heads from wells that could be 1/4 to 1 mile away. These people are "subsistence farmers" and although poor we did not see malnutrition. They are very clean as are their clothes so obviously carry a lot of water. Every morning they sweep the area clean around their homes from the droppings of chickens, ducks etc. Their homes have been small round mud brick huts with conical thatched roofs which I really loved. The new houses are rectangular, larger with aluminum roofs.

Daylight is from about 6AM to 6PM as they are so close to the equator so it was fall/winter there, days were warm and sunny nights chilly. In the evenings we were entertained with music and dancing around a small fire. We had "the roosters from hell" waking us at 3:30 to 4AM, we are hoping some didn't survive the cooking pot.

In Mombasa, Kenya we built a house for a girl named "Zwadi", she is a "total orphan" her parents died of Aids and her aunt and uncle are raising her, and 4 cousins. Just a few short months ago she was bedridden, now with "anti viral" drugs she is a norman, energetic 12 yr. old facing a fairly normal long life. Their home was a "mud and wattle" style that was falling down around their heads, the thatch roof was missing in many places and patched here and there with sheets of plastic. We built the same type house mixing, stacking and flinging mud with our bare hands, this house also now has a roof of aluminum. We also added an aluminum roof for another "orphan" Simon, who is living with his HIV free brothers. Neither house had electricity or water and was in a slum area and on a steep hillside. Water had to be carried on heads down a steep hill and up another for all their needs.

We think and hope that we not only provided better housing for these families but also brought warmth and good will to them. It's very much a people to people experience and there washer/dryer, your heat, your AC, take a moment to feel how lucky we all are to be living in such comparable luxury, I know I do. ### **Amargosa Amateur Radio Club**

By Glen Schoeck Field Day is an annual amateur radio exercise, widely sponsored by International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) regions and member organizations, encouraging emergency communications preparedness among amateur radio operators. In the United States, it is typically the largest single emergency preparedness exercise in the country, with over 30,000 operators participating each year. Since the first Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL) Field Day in 1933, radio amateurs throughout North America have practiced the rapid deployment of radio communications equipment in environments ranging from operations under tents in remote areas to operations inside Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs). Operations using emergency and alternative power sources are highly encouraged, since electricity and other public infrastructures are often among the first to fail during a natural disaster or severe weather. To determine the effectiveness of the exercise and of each participant's operations, there is an integrated contesting component, and many clubs also engage in concurrent leisure activities (camping out, cookouts, etc.). Operations typically last a continuous twenty-four hours, requiring scheduled relief operators to keep stations on the air. Additional contest points are awarded for experimenting with unusual modes, making contacts via satellite, and involving youth in the activity.

This was the Club's third Field Day and we managed all but four states, and two Canadian provinces for a total of 236 contacts. We all enjoyed camaraderie, good food, and some good stories. There is now another 2 meter repeater in the valley. 146.910 - 123.0 pl, is a Nevada Amateur Radio Repeater Inc. (NARRI) repeater and connected to the western reflector via the internet. This is worldwide depending on where the stations are connected from.

We would like to let everyone know that some of our hams also monitor CB channel 19, and FRS channel 1 with no discrepancy channels. Interested in becoming a Ham? The club has all license class manuals to loan so if you want to become a Technician, General, Or Extra we can help, contact Gene at 372-1282. Also sometime in August we will setup a HF station so that kids in the Library reading program might have a chance to speak with a country they have been reading about.
