FROM THIS CORNER OF THE WORLD

Thursday, December 20, 2007, was not a nice day. It was cold and the wind was blowing with sustained winds of at least 40 miles per hour – in all directions. Gusts were probably as high as the mid-60s mph. At 6:00 p.m., I was feeling a little sorry for myself as I went to my van to drive to the Town Board meeting. I really wanted to curl up with a cat and a good book. I turned onto 373 and, as I passed the Pizza Store, I saw it.

“It” was what looked like every fire vehicle our Volunteer Fire Department in a circle around a structure (or more – it was too dark to tell) on Pueblo about a block from Anvil. My self-pity disappeared. I started praying: that the people and their pets were safe; that the firemen and firewomen were safe; that the people didn’t lose everything; and that the Fire Department could keep the fire from spreading. I couldn’t imagine, with the spread of the equipment there and the wind, that any of my prayers would have been answered, but I prayed anyway. And miracles do happen.

I learned early the next morning that the family and their pet had escaped unharmed, though they lost all of their possessions. And, the Fire Department had suffered no injuries and had managed to keep the fire from spreading to nearby trees or other homes – a feat that still amazes me. And then the REAL miracle occurred – Amargosa style.

The family that was burned out had moved here not long ago from Michigan. They didn’t know a lot of local folks. The parents and the young adult son lived in the house. The parents both worked at the Horizon Academy. Their daughter, her son, and fiancé had arrived only a couple of days before to visit for the holidays. When it was clear that they had lost their home, someone took them in. Then someone (Theresa Jacobs, I think) called Jim Marsh, who gave them four nights at the Longstreet for free. The Volunteers of the Fire Department got on the phone, spreading the word of their loss. Jade Robinson was going to give them a condo at the Academy for two months until it was needed for a prior commitment, but by noon the next day, the family had a trailer to rent for as long as they needed it (thank you, Shelly Kadrmas and Jerry and Genne Nelson). The Senior Center opened its storage trailer and told the family to take what they

needed. People from throughout the Valley started going through their houses and storage boxes, looking for anything that would be useful. Anonymous donations poured into the Academy. Amanda Cheney probably spent the majority of the day answering questions about what they had and what they needed. Furniture, household goods, food, curtains, rugs, appliances – you name it, it was donated, in many cases multiple times. There was so much donated, including multiples of many things, which the Town has built a storage compartment to save the things this family didn’t need for the next time.

On this last weekend before Christmas, when most people were finishing their shopping and attending parties, Shelly and Amanda organized a fundraiser pot luck and auction. On Saturday night, the Volunteers from the Fire Department hauled things from the Academy to the new trailer home and set up the household for the family. And when I say set up, I mean Set Up. Drawers and cupboards were filled. Furniture was placed. It was no longer just a house; they made it a home.

On Sunday afternoon, about 75 people, including almost the entire Fire Department and their families, came to eat and argue over who would out-bid whom for cakes, pies, tamales, goodies baskets and all sorts of other good things. And the donations, mostly anonymous, continued to pour in. Among my favorites were the twenty-something useful things that Glenda Leonard wrapped as Christmas presents so that the family would have something under their new tree. Over three thousand dollars were raised. The family was amazed about the entire weekend. It seems that things like this don’t happen in other communities. But they do here -- which is one of the reasons most of us love living here. We may argue and fight, but when someone needs help, we help.

I think that, for most of the people who had a part (large or small) in the miracles of those three days, this was one of the best Christmases ever. My thanks to all of those who helped out, especially the Volunteer Fire Department. You make this Valley special. I hope the rest of your holidays were as good. And, if you see one of our volunteers, say thank you. They deserve it. Happy New Year.

A CELEBRATION OF LIFE

A Celebration of Life was held for Charles E. Holtz, on January 20, 2008 at his home on Diablo Drive. Charles or Charlie is one of Amargosa's oldest and long time resident of Amargosa Valley. The Celebration was for his 91st birthday.

Charlie was born on January 18, 1917, in Warren PA to Chester Holtz and Florence Highouse. His parents would later move the family to Erie, PA, where Charlie, his two brothers and one sister grew up. In 1941 Charlie married Helen Flanagan, of Erie, and became the father of four sons.

In 1950, Charlie moved his family to Downey CA, to accept a lucrative position with Aerojet. In 1968, he moved to Amargosa Valley. Charlie worked at the Nevada Test Site as a Physist and an Electrical Engineer. He would also work for Timex at Henderson and part time at IMV. He also served as a Math Teacher in Amargosa, and was one of the first Directors for Valley Electric. Charlie would retire from Bechtel at the Test Site in the 1990's to grow many varieties of grapes, which he later made into wine.

Widowed in 1999, he would later marry Ruby H. Happel-Holtz of Pahrump, in 2001.

Charlie is a 53 year member in good standing of the Bellfleur Masonic Order, in Downey, CA, and a Veteran of the Armed Forces.
