(3) It is a long way to drive to the Center. Yes, it is. It is a long way to drive anywhere in Amargosa Valley. So? (4) I really like my own cooking. Well, so do I, but Fred is a wonderful cook, and he also does the dishes. Does that happen at your house? (5) When you get older, you might think about it, but you are too busy now. Well, if you don't think about it now, it might not be there when you do.

What will happen if, heaven forbid, you and your husband are in a car accident and are injured, and you can't get to the store for groceries? Sure, a neighbor will get them, for a while. But even with the groceries, what if you can't stand long enough to cook or can only make cereal. Well, call the Senior Center. They will deliver full meals for you week in and week out (and ask you to pay only \$2/meal for the weekends). So you can concentrate your energy on getting well and taking care of your other needs. But that won't happen if there isn't a Senior Center. And, if you lose your spouse, how lonely it will be. At the Senior Center, it would be a little less lonely.

And, even if you never really <u>need</u> the Senior Center, you will be helping to preserve it for those who do. Dinner is served from 4-5:30, Monday through Friday. Dinner is only a \$2.00 suggested donation for those 60 and over and their spouses. So, try it. You just might like it.
