The Clinics are staying open and providing the services that they have been providing. However, the State Health Nurse will not be providing services at those clinics or elsewhere within the two communities. In an effort to save money, the State Health Nurses will no longer make periodic visits to provide low-cost immunizations, screenings, and counseling. Those services are still available through the Clinic staff. And Amargosa Valley residents could go to Pahrump (250 N. Hwy. 160, suite 6) to receive those services on Monday through Friday from 8:00 to 5:00.

FROM THIS CORNER OF THE WORLD

I usually like for this space to be informative and light-hearted, but sometimes that is difficult. This is such a time. I had to put one of my all-time favorite putty cats down last week. You all know how hard that is. And, since I have been thinking about writing a book about my cats, I decide to introduce one of them to you.

Ashley-the-Cat was a wonderful cat. He was the first cat I had as an adult. We had two Siamese kitties when I was young; one of them was officially mine. But I went many years without feline companionship. My career required extensive travel, and I didn't think it was fair to an animal to see it only on weekends, so I did without. In 1985, I finally was living and working in the same area: Northern Virginia/Washington, DC. I had put my house on the market, because I thought I was going to move out of the area, but I got a job in Washington, so I pulled the listing. In the course of the potential sale, my realtor and I had talked a lot. So when I pulled the listing, she said, "I know you love cats and I know one who needs a home. Would vou be interested?" Her daughter had agreed to keep a cat for a friend for a few weeks and it was still there four months later. I told her I would be glad to discuss it with the cat.

I contacted the daughter and arranged for him to visit over a long weekend. I heard them coming, opened the door and saw her carrying the biggest cat, with the biggest eyes, that I had ever seen. He was a tabby Persian with big golden eyes. She handed him to me. I greeted him and asked if he wanted to look around. He did. Off he went through the first floor and then up the stairs to the second. The daughter was amazed. Apparently, he had spent the first three days in her house lying in the same corner.

After the daughter left, I went looking for Ashley-the-Cat. He was curled up in the guest bathroom sink (filling it) in front of an open window. I told him he looked very well in there and went about my business, stopping to pet him several times during the day.

At dinner time, I called and he came, and I knew, as did he, that we had been adopted. It took Ashley-the-Cat a while to get affectionate, but he was always interesting. About a week after he arrived, I was sitting in one of the living room chairs. I

glanced over at the chair on the other side of the lamp-table and there was Ashley-the-Cat, sitting just like a person (legs out in front of him, back against the chair arm/back), looking at me. All he needed was a brandy snifter and a cigar. He always joined the "other people" when they sat in the family or living rooms, usually sitting on a chair or sofa, just like we were.

At night, Ashley-the-Cat always slept on my bed. He started very early stepping up on my chest and letting me pet him as he "put me to bed". The he started stepping on my stomach, walking to my chest, and putting me to bed. Eventually, he walked up the length of my leg to my chest. At that point, he finally started purring. He liked playing with a Q-tip or wad of paper as much as he did an expensive toy. Ashley-the-Cat was very protective of me. When the doorbell rang or someone knocked, he always went to the door with me to make sure everything was OK. I learned to trust his judgment about people.

When I was hired for the Yucca Mountain Project, he rode across country to Las Vegas with me. As long as his litter box and I were along, Ashley-the-Cat was happy and a very good traveler. He welcomed siblings (he got three) with a small hiss and then accepted them. In Las Vegas, I had a large kitchen. He used to lie on the counter next to the stove, sniffing the cooking spaghetti sauce. I thought that he just want the sauce until one night when I was eating spaghetti and left the table to get something. I turned around and there was Ashleythe-Cat, standing on my chair, with his paws on the table, eating my spaghetti. He also liked spaghetti without sauce. One day, I had some draining in the kitchen sink and left the room. When I returned, I saw a very large tabby bottom sticking out of the sink. "What are you doing?" I asked. He turned around, spaghetti hanging from both sides of his mouth, and opened his eyes even further. I was laughing too hard to get seriously upset. I figured, if I could share my bed, I could share my spaghetti.

He loved me, and I loved him. I still miss him, though it has been thirteen years since I had to put him down.

Why, you might ask, was he called Ashley-the-Cat? Well, actually, his name was Ashley. But I talked about him a lot at the job I had just started when we adopted each other. One lady finally asked me, "And how old is your son?" After that, I thought I should probably make a distinction. Happy Halloween. Have a great month.
